On May 16, Ripon Community Hospital's inaugural day of Alaris Pump integration occurred. Having our pumps that infuse medications and fluids talking to our electronic medical record is a wonderful step in patient safety. Not only does this integration reduce keystrokes in documenting for staff, but it greatly decreases opportunities for manual programming errors. This allows documentation to occur just in time and coordinates care for patients from pharmacy to the nurse. Ripon Community Hospital is the first hospital in Greater Fond du Lac to experience this upgrade. St. Agnes Hospital will go-live in June and Waupun Memorial Hospital in July.

TREASURER'S UPDATE

FINANCIAL REPORT | April 30, 2023

The past four months have been pretty quiet for the Auxiliary. The only fundraising was the \$402 collected for the Candy Bar Sale. We also received \$8 in donations in the Gift Shop.

Gift Shop sales for January through April were \$8,129, 19% higher than last year, January through April. Sales lagged earlier in the fiscal year, so year to date sales were 2.6% below last year for the ten months.

Gift Shop expenses include merchandise purchased for sale but not yet sold. Inventory will be adjusted at year end.

We continued to provide a "goodie bag" of treats to hospital and clinic staff for Valentine's Day at a cost of \$516.64.

We had \$39,709 in cash at the end of April. So, we have the funds for the three \$1,000 scholarships that we will award in June, as well as funds to meet the needs of RCH. The Board is currently working with hospital administration to identify those needs.

PUBLIC POLICY EDUCATION







Advocacy Day was held on Wednesday, April 19th at Monona Terrace in Madison. Jason Blonigen, Jackie Halverson and Julie Stellmacher attended the event.

The Conference opened with a discussion moderated by WHA President and CEO, Eric Borgerding and Governor James Doyle and Governor Tommy G. Thompson. It was quite an interesting conversation between the former Governors and how things have changed over the years regarding politics.

There was also a Legislative Panel with State Representative Mark Born (R-Beaver Dam), State Representative Evan Goyke (D-Milwaukee), State Senator LaTonya Johnson (D-Milwaukee) and State Senator Pat Testin (R-Stevens Point). They discussed the State Budget and the \$7million surplus. Items discussed were the workforce shortage, affordable childcare, affordable college and education, mental health needs, hospitals and nursing homes. Governor Evers also spoke at our luncheon regarding the State Budget. We were encouraged to develop a relationship with your legislator and your hospital. This relationship will help you when and if you should go to the Capital to advocate for issues that may occur.

It's always nice to talk to other people from other hospitals and volunteers or auxiliaries regarding how things are going at their facilities. It was a very interesting day. Julie Stellmacher, Auxiliary President

COMMUNITY HEALTH EDUCATION

Lyme Disease: It is that time of year to think about ticks and Lyme Disease.

Lyme disease is a bacterial infection caused by the bite of infected black-legged ticks, also known as deer ticks. It is the most common vector-borne (transmitted by a living organism) disease in the United States. Ticks are tiny, about the size of a poppy seed or pin head. They can hide in the hair, armpits, groin, and behind the knees. Ticks must be attached 36-48 hours to transmit the disease.

The initial symptoms from an infected tick bite include fever and chills, headache, fatigue, swollen lymph nodes, and a characteristic "bullseye" rash that is not painful or itchy. The symptoms usually occur 3-30 days following the bite. If left untreated, the disease can spread to the joints, heart, and nervous system and cause serious, long-term illness.

Diagnosis: An individual is diagnosed with Lyme disease by taking a history of exposure to ticks in areas where Lyme disease is prevalent, looking at signs and symptoms experienced, and the results of blood tests. The blood tests measure the antibodies the body is making to fight the bacteria.

Removal: take a pair of fine-tipped tweezers, pulling the tick upward with steady pressure. Clean the area with rubbing alcohol or soap & water.

Treatment: A few weeks of antibiotic therapy is usually successful in treating Lyme cases. Treatment does not create immunity to Lyme disease. If you are bitten again by an infected tick, you can develop the illness again!

Prevention: There are several steps you can take to prevent Lyme Disease per CDC guidelines.

- 1. Use insect repellent containing DEET, eucalyptus, or oil of lemon. There are also chemical products that are effective and can be purchased.
- 2. Wear pants and socks when in wooded areas or when handling fallen leaves.
- 3. Shower ASAP (or within 2 hours) after spending time outdoors, using a washcloth.
- 4. Check for ticks daily: hair, around the ears, armpits, groin, and behind the knees.
- 5. Tumble dry clothes on high heat for 10 minutes. If the clothing is damp, dry the clothing first, then tumble dry on high heat for 10 minutes.
- 6. A chemical called permethrin can be applied to clothing and camping gear.
- 7. There is no vaccine for Lyme disease at the present time.




FUNDRAISING OPPORTUNITES
