### **Director's Letter**

I am excited to begin this message with some great news from our Well Wisher Gift Shop. Twice a year, after reviewing the gift shop's financial performance, a transfer of funds is made to the Partner Volunteers in support of the Annual Wish List awards and Partner Volunteer scholarships for high school students. I am excited to share that a transfer of \$38,000 has been completed. Truly great news since this time last year, the transfer was \$22,000. While I am the fortunate bearer of this great news, the credit



definitely goes to the gift shop volunteers for their ability to return to pre-Covid hours Monday-Friday with half the number of volunteers. A big thank you to all of you, as well as our staff, who continue to shop and support the gift shop.

Another sign that things are looking up, the health network will shift its visitor status as of March 9. The hospital will move from our current restrictions to "usual" status which allows for two visitors at the same time in all of our care settings. Inpatients may have four visitors for the duration of their stay, with two being allowed in the room at the same time. Since guidelines are in place for visiting patients in isolation, we will also no longer differentiate visitation for patients with or suspected of COVID-19. Moving to this more open visitor status is appropriate given the current COVID-19 community positivity rates. Supporting the importance of visitation for our patients, adhering to infection prevention guidelines and being mindful of overall safety and security, we expect this "usual" visitor status to be part of our new normal moving forward.

With these updated visitor guidelines, Patient Ambassador volunteers in the hospital will return to delivering mail and gifts to patient rooms/alcoves along with assisting with wayfinding and transporting. With the vaccination requirements for volunteers, the masking and social distancing guidelines and enhanced infection prevention measures that have all been put into place, we are confident in your safety. Similar to pre-COVID, volunteers should not enter rooms with isolation signage. Please make sure to continue to practice proper hand hygiene in addition to wearing the required mask over **both** your nose and mouth.

A challenge we have had since volunteers returned to service last year has been with departments realizing you are back, particularly with the Patient Ambassador desk. In an effort for staff to recognize volunteers are available for transport, wayfinding, discharge, etc. we are looking to condense the hospital Patient Ambassador desk to two shifts; 6:30-10:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.—1:00 p.m. Our ambassador desks in both the hospital and health center have half the number of volunteers and, therefore, we have some days when there are no volunteers at the desks. Temporarily adjusting the length of time each day for the hospital desk, and providing volunteers from 6:30 a.m.-1:00 p.m., Monday through Friday will hopefully provide more consistency for departments in need of transporting support for them to remember to call the desk.

Patient Ambassador volunteers, please consider signing up for the first or second shifts previously outlined when sharing availability, as we continue to implement steps to get us back on track.

A few more updates and reminders to share:

- All onsite volunteers need to have the white Emergency Medical Alert card behind their name badge. If you do not
  have the white card, a supply is located next to the Volgistics kiosk. Please make sure to pick one up on your next
  scheduled shift.
- A secure, locked volunteer drop box has been installed by the Volgistics kiosk. This can be used to return requested paperwork, vaccine verifications, annual education quizzes, etc., to Volunteer Services. The box will be checked on a weekly basis.
- Food and eating precautions are still in place for the hospital regarding potlucks and home-prepared food so we unfortunately will not be able to hold the spring Partner Volunteer bake sale in May.
- Wisconsin Hospital Association's Partner Volunteer Advocacy Day will take place on Wednesday, March 23 from 8:30-11:45 a.m. The event will be held virtually again this year and is a good opportunity to hear information and updates about health care in Wisconsin. Any and all are welcome since the meeting is virtual. Hospitals are regularly reviewed by the Joint Commission, on behalf of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (as well as other insurance carriers), to ensure they meet a minimum set of standards for funding and reimbursements. Surveyors show up unannounced so it's important we are prepared at all times. Froedtert West Bend Hospital's survey window is now until April 27. 
### Well Wisher Transfers \$38,000 to Volunteers

### **Health Education**

#### **MORE COVID**

After 2 years of both triumphs and missteps, a lot of us have grown frustrated with science. Vaccines are miracles – or they're not. "Long Covid" is a thing – or it's A not. Omicron, Delta and other variants have thrown our best planning and predictions into chaos time and again. And across the country, public health practices are more and more driven by politics, media and culture rather than by science.

Until the Omicron variant emerged breakthrough infections in immunized individuals were rare. It appears that Omicron has ha greater ability to circumnavigate the initial vaccine series and makes it even more urgent to add a booster and to take extra precautions. Unvaccinated people are 6 times more likely to catch Covid and 14 times more likely to die from it, according to CDC.

The fact is, all vaccines vary in their effectiveness. The goal set for Covid-19 was 50%; they surprised us by hitting over 90%. Our annual flu shots come in around 40% - 60% each year. But getting vaccinated dramatically stacks the odds in your favor and makes any illness you do experience much less severe.

It's entirely normal for antibodies generated by vaccines to wane over time and require a boost. What we know is that even after 2 Covid immunizations our antibody levels drop and that's why we need boosters. The fact is that the virus is changing, and our approach to it has to change as well.

"Herd Immunity" occurs when a large enough portion of a community becomes immune to a disease that its spread from person to person becomes unlikely. How high that portion needs to be is based largely on how contagious the disease is; the more easily it spreads, the more people you need to be immune in order to contain it. As to Covid, science hasn't yet determined the threshold, but estimates put it at north of 90% of the population.
