Mission Action Team

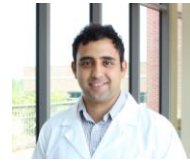

Nurses Week

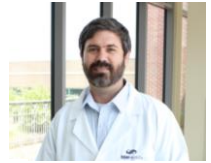

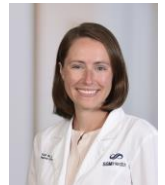

TREASURER'S UPDATE

Financial Report – April 30, 2024

Candy Bar Sales have been going well. We collected \$2,063.50 during January through April. Store roundups from Markesan Piggly Wiggly and Culver's were \$681.22. We had a first-time Easter Bake Sale that netted \$376.40 plus \$32 in donations.

Gift Shop sales for January through April were \$10,457.45, 29% higher than last year's January through April. Fiscal year to date sales were 34% above last year for the ten months.

Gift Shop expenses include merchandise purchased for sale but not yet sold. Inventory will be adjusted at year end.

We continued to provide a "goodie bag" of treats to hospital and clinic staff for Valentine's Day in appreciation for their work at a cost of \$359.44. We also resupplied the inpatient comfort cart at a cost of \$98.98. Finally, the sewing committee has been very busy with blankets, shawls, walker bags, and other items for the hospital and hospice. The Auxiliary spent \$401.99 on the materials for this committee.

We had \$50,385 in cash at the end of April. The hospital administration has identified the need for about \$4,800 to be donated in May and the three \$1,500 scholarships will be awarded in June. The Board is currently working with hospital administration to identify additional needs.

FUND-RAISING REPORT 2023

The fund-raising report for the last five calendar years shows us the before and after COVID-19 activity. Before everything shut down in March 2020, the Auxiliary held the Valentine's Day Bake sale, a Nutman sale and Book Fair. After that, in-house fund raisers, like Uniform sale, PTK sale, Candle sale, Christmas Bake Sale, and Raffle, were cancelled. Even the Brat Fry sales and Mum sale were cancelled that year.

Although the tree lighting event was not held, donations for Lights of Love were very generous in 2020. Candy Bar and Flower Basket sales exceeded pre-COVID-19 amounts. A new fund-raiser, Store Roundups, brought in added donations.

Post-COVID-19 fund raising has been successful. Vendor sales will not return, and the Auxiliary has discontinued the raffle. The Treats for Sweets bake sale has been replaced with a Staff Appreciation gift. But Brat Fry sales and the Mum sale are back. Net income from the Flower Basket sales and Candy Bar sales have increased. Store Roundups and Lights of Love donations remain steady. The Christmas Bake sale was brought back in December 2023.

Our successful fund raising has enabled the Auxiliary to provide Ripon Community Hospital with equipment and supplies, as well as three scholarships to students pursuing a career in healthcare.

Severe Mental Health Disorder Characteristics, Symptoms and Treatment

The Many Faces of Depression

Depression is a common condition. There are a variety of types of depression all of which have specific symptoms and levels of severity. Depression is a mood disorder that can affect emotions, thoughts, and daily functioning. It is one of the most reported mental health conditions in the United States. It is prevalent among people of all ages, genders, income levels and educational experience.

There is not one specific cause of depression. Dr. Alison Yarp points out research shows it can be caused by a combination of psychological, genetic, biological, and environmental factors. Depression often surfaces in adulthood, but it can also affect children and adolescents. Some risk factors for depression include a family history of depression, major life changes, traumatic events, chronic stress, specific physical conditions, and medications.

The following types of depression and their diagnostic criteria are from the fifth edition of the **Diagnostic and Statistical Manual for Mental Disorders**:

Major Depressive Disorder (MDD) is diagnosed when a person has at least five symptoms all day and almost every day for a minimum of two weeks. Symptoms for MDD are depressed mood, decreased interest or enjoyment of daily activities, sleep issues, fatigue, or loss of energy, feeling worthless and/or guilty, difficulty concentrating, and thoughts of death or suicide.

Persistent Depressive Disorder (PDD) is also known as dysthymia. It is characterized by a depressive mood that is present most of the day, most days, for at least two years. A PDD diagnosis consists of a minimum of two of these symptoms: decreased appetite or overeating, insomnia or sleeping more than usual, low energy, low self-esteem, difficulty concentrating or making decisions and feeling hopeless.

Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD) is a form of depression that occurs seasonally. Symptoms of SAD are the same as those of Major Depressive Disorder. (See MDD symptoms above.) To be diagnosed with SAD, symptoms of major depression must occur for two consecutive years during the same season of the year.

Bipolar I Disorder was once called manic-depressive disorder or manic depression. This condition causes noticeable shifts in mood and energy, as well as actions and behaviors. Alterations in mood range from overly elated and elevated mood (manic episodes) to down and sad periods of depression. Bipolar I disorder is diagnosed when manic episodes occur for at least seven days or cause a need for hospitalization due to symptom severity. Depressive episodes can also occur.

Bipolar II Disorder occurs when there is a combination of depressive episodes and periods of hypomania. If any manic behavior develops, the condition will not be classified as Bipolar II. Cyclothymic Disorder is another type of bipolar disorder. Patients with this condition experience many episodes of hypomania and depression for at least two years.

Treatments for depression can be nonmedication or medication options. Nonmedication treatments involve psychotherapy or talk therapy. Such methods teach coping skills, new ways of thinking, behaving, and interacting. This approach may change habits over time that affect mood in a negative way. Cognitive Behavioral Therapy and Interpersonal Therapy have shown some success in treating patients with depression.

Dealing with depression most often involves a combination of professional treatment and lifestyle changes. Following the established treatment plan is critical to improved mental health. Those efforts can be supported by getting adequate rest, regular exercise, eating healthy meals and avoiding alcohol, tobacco, and recreational drugs.

Encourage Wisconsin Graduates to Pursue a Career in Health Care

This time each year marks a season of celebration, as soon-to-be-graduates finish out their final courses and prepare to embark on their new careers. This time of year, also marks National Hospital Week, a time to commemorate the care provided by the healthcare teams in Wisconsin hospitals who are leading the way in quality and value and serve a vital safety-net role in our communities.

These May observances highlight our nation's workforce and the way in which younger generations continually shape its future. They also offer an opportunity to recognize the role hospitals and health systems – including their current and future workforce – will play as Wisconsin and the nation undergo pivotal demographic shifts.

The Wisconsin Hospital Association's 2024 Healthcare Workforce Report shed light on the workforce challenges facing our state's hospitals. Job vacancy rates surged in 2021 and 2022 and remain in double digits for 8 of 18 healthcare professions. In particular, Wisconsin's nursing workforce is not growing rapidly enough to keep pace with rising demand. Adding pressure to the need for our workforce to expand is the reality that a quarter of Wisconsinites are at retirement age. This creates a dual challenge we refer to as the "Silver Tsunami" – the aging population requires more healthcare yet leaves open more job vacancies than younger generations are filling. As the last of the large Baby Boomer generation reaches age 65 in 2030, the workforce storm will ease for other industries, but demand for healthcare will continue to surge for decades to come.
