April was volunteer month, April 8-12, 2019, was designated as National Volunteer Week. No matter the day, month or year our volunteers work diligently at HSHS Sacred Heart Hospital to make things warmer and more pleasant for our patients and guests. You always come ready to give your all and do whatever is asked of you! I'd like to share some statistics of things we accomplished. For the calendar year 2018, our volunteers:

- Contributed the following to HSHS Sacred Heart Hospital:
 - \$34,000 pledge (total pledge is \$100,000 paid in a 3-year pledge; Oct. 2018 is 1st pledge payment) for the PREVEA Cancer Center renovation
 - \$20,000 gifted to The Healing Place
 - \$5,000 Tuition Assistance Grant (TAG) Scholarships
- Provided a variety of handcrafts to various departments such as rice sox and baby hats for maternity; quilts and blankets for Palliative Care, Dialysis and children; hats and scarves for cancer patients; and much more!
- Volunteers, Colleagues and our community supported our Annual Coat & Food Drives
- Mission Outreach: championed and collected 136 backpacks and other items for our school district's Homeless Schoolsite Program so these youth could have a positive start to the school year
- Mission Outreach: collected 166 hygiene kits for the Homeless Schoolsite Program (according to the coordinator these kits were probably the only gift they would receive at Christmas time)
- Hosted several in-house fundraisers
- Donated 25,200 hours of service
- Served in multiple departments

Our colleagues, physicians, patients, their families and friends would feel a great loss if we didn't have the smiling, joyful volunteers who grace our halls and departments every day of the week. Can you imagine if there was:

- Nobody to smile and greet you as you walk in.
- · No assistance with finding your way.
- · A closed, dark gift shop.
- No book, gift or \$6 sales.

- No greeter in the Family Waiting Center.

TAG (TUITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM)

Each year, the Volunteer Partners of HSHS Sacred Heart Hospital awards five \$1,000 Tuition Assistance Grants to colleagues and volunteers who are pursuing a degree in the healthcare field. We are proud to support them as they further their education. Here is some information about this year's worthy grant recipients.

Scott Capek is an Anesthesia Tech in Surgery and has worked at the Hospital since 2008. He is pursuing a Master's in professional Counseling Degree from Liberty University which he expects to complete in 2020. He plans to provide a faith based option for individuals who desire a Christian perspective to counseling.

Caryn Lange is a Registered Nurse at the L. E. Philips-Libertas Treatment Center and has worked there since 2017. My name is Amy Lokken and I work as a nurse in the Women and Infants Center at Sacred Heart Hospital and have since the beginning of my nursing career 11 years ago. I love the challenge that comes with nursing. I love fast-paced environments and environments that encourage critical-thinking. I love multi-tasking and keeping busy. I absolutely love labor and delivery and the challenge of coaching a laboring mother and the joy of every new birth. Every birth is unique and different.

I have many career goals: I am currently enrolled at Morningside University and am taking courses to obtain my graduate degree in the Family Nurse Practitioner Program. Upon completion, I plan to obtain my Doctorate in Family Medicine. I am currently certified in Electronic Fetal Monitoring and Inpatient Obstetrics and am working toward becoming a national AWHONN fetal monitoring course instructor at this time. Receiving this Tuition Grant means so much to me. Having the support of the Volunteer Partners to go back to school and pursue my dreams is encouraging, motivating, and humbling. I truly appreciate the support Sacred Heart and the Volunteer Partners have given me in my journey to learn and grow professionally and personally.

Your support in continuing my education means so much to me, and will be a great help as I embark on the next step of my scholastic journey. I'm pleased to tell you that this May I will be graduating from University of Wisconsin Eau Claire (UWEC) with my Bachelor degree in Nursing. At the same time I will be applying for special status to UWEC's Doctorate of Nursing Practice Program which will allow me to start taking graduate courses while I wait to be formally accepted into the program.

My goal is to become a Family Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner with an additional specialization in treating addictions. The area of mental health and addictions is something that is very important to me because it is an area where patients face a lot of stigma and discrimination. As an advocate of social justice I want to do everything in my ability as a healthcare provider to decrease the disparities in care that many of these patients experience. I believe that everyone is entitled to the healthcare they need to achieve their own health and well-being, and this is something that I aim to provide even through my current practice as a Registered Nurse at LE Phillips Libertas Treatment Center in Chippewa Falls. This unique facility provides medical detox from alcohol and other drugs as well as a 28 day residential sober living program. Our vision at LE Phillips is not only to provide hope in healing the body, but also to provide counseling services that will help heal the mind by identifying underlying mental health issues that may be contributing to current patient situations. At the Center we work together on addressing these issues so that healthy coping mechanisms can then be developed and utilized when patients go back home. I feel very fortunate to be working there because it has given me the opportunity to meet and care for many incredible people.

I have learned so much through my experiences at the Center that have only strengthened my passion for this area of medicine, and in taking the next steps toward becoming a Nurse Practitioner. I'm excited and look toward my future in continuing to work in this specialty helping people experiencing mental health and addiction issues.

PUBLIC POLICY AND EDUCATION

Eric Borgerding, Wisconsin Hospital Association President and CEO states that Wisconsin's healthcare is one of our most valued assets and ranked number one in the Midwest and fourth in the nation. It is "available to every person, every minute, every day in our state's hospitals."

Wisconsin's hospitals are foundations of our communities that help address critical unmet local health and human service needs. These hospitals provide over \$5 million every day for free care and community benefits. Wisconsin's hospitals support healthcare centers, aid in citizens being able to have access to free meals, assist in purchasing their medications, help find transportation, and provide many other areas of need. In Wisconsin, the Medicaid program reimburses just 65% of every dollar spent on patients and Medicare reimbursement is about 78% of the cost of a patient's care. Still, hospitals continue to stay open and care for the needy.

Governor Evers 2019 budget contains an \$83.4 billion plan that would expand Medicaid to 82,000 people who are either uninsured or underinsured. Governor Evers would count on enhanced Federal funding to cover newly eligible individuals. The proposed budget includes a \$365 million increase in hospital reimbursement for the Medicaid Disproportionate Share Hospital program. It also includes a \$69 million reimbursement increase in behavioral health services. The budget bill is still being debated.

HEALTH EDUCATION

The Community Health Education topic for the coming year for the Partners of WHA is mental health. Mental health is defined by the World Health Organization as a state of well-being in which every individual realizes his or her own potential, can work productively and fruitfully, and is able to make a contribution to her or his community. Mental health includes emotional, psychological and social well-being affecting how we think, feel and act. It helps determine how we handle stress, relate to others and make choices. Many factors contribute to mental health problems, including biological factors, life experiences, family history of mental health problems and seasonal affective disorder (SAD). Mental health can affect physical health – eating, sleeping and activity. If you don't have a healthy mental state, it will be hard for you to live your life to its fullest extent. Mental disorders are diagnosable illnesses in which thinking processes, mood or behavior are altered, resulting in distress and inability to function in daily life.

So, why do the Partners of WHA want to take on this focus? The answer is because mental health affects ALL of society in some way. We as volunteers in healthcare can make a difference – learning, understanding and advocating for actions that provide equity of care for all health issues, the visible (physical) and the invisible (mental).

A SNACKER'S PARADISE

HISTORICAL CORNER

80 YEARS AND GOING STRONG!

The Volunteer Partners of HSHS Sacred Heart Hospital will celebrate 80 years of service to the Hospital, its patients and colleagues in November 2019. It all began in 1939 when Sister Calista, Superior asked Mrs. Laurene McIntyre to help organize a group of ladies to volunteer at the Hospital. On November 1, 1939, a group of 15 women met in the nurses' home to discuss objectives and procedures, and Mrs. McIntyre was elected as the first president. The motto was "Volunteers caring for the patient, family, hospital and community through service and dedication."

An enrollment Tea was held on November 17, 1939, attended by 185 women, and a volunteer work program was set up with three groups: mending and sewing, making surgical dressings and Christmas decorating at the Hospital. Over the years the organization's name has changed. In 1963 the name was changed to the Auxiliary. In 1996 there was a name change to Partners of Sacred Heart Hospital and in 1998 the organization became the Volunteer Partners of Sacred Heart Hospital.
