PUBLIC POLICY EDUCATION

Legislative Council Study Committee on Occupational Licenses Holds First Hearing

The Wisconsin Legislative Council Study Committee on Occupational Licenses held its first hearing on Tuesday, August 2. The committee, which is comprised of four legislators and five members of the public, including WHA's SVP Workforce and Clinical Practice Ann Zenk, is tasked with reviewing and improving occupational licensure processes in Wisconsin.

The committee heard presentations from the Wisconsin Legislative Council, the Wisconsin Legislative Fiscal Bureau, the National Conference on State Legislatures, and the Wisconsin Department of Safety and Professional Services (DSPS). The presentations included a look at new policies states have enacted in recent years, such as more portable licensure via compacts, reciprocity agreements, endorsement, or universal licensure recognition policies.

New DSPS Secretary-designee Dan Hereth and Legislative Liaison Mike Tierney noted they have been working hard to reduce the time it takes for people to obtain licensure and praised WHA and its members for working with them to improve their new electronic licensure process. Both DSPS leaders noted the collaborative relationship they have with WHA and its members and their work to prioritize licensure for health care practitioners when they become aware of delays either from WHA, its members, or legislative offices.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Financial Report, Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2022

Here are the financial results for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2022, compared to the three previous years. Fiscal years 2020 and 2021 were both affected by COVID-19. The gift shop was closed for part of each year and in-house fundraisers were not held. The gift shop was open all of fiscal year 2022. Sales were down from pre-COVID-19 days because of less traffic in the hospital but expenses were also reduced so profit was about the same. We were able to raise \$19,678 after expenses from the off-site fundraisers of Lights of Love, Raffle, Flower Basket Sale, Mum Sale, Candy Bar Sales, Brat Fry and Store Roundup.

We awarded three \$1,000 scholarships this Spring. We provided funds to RCH for two transport chairs and an IV vein finder, as well as supplies for the Samaritan House and the inpatient hospitality cart. We also provided an appreciation treat to the hospital and clinic staff that was very well received. Cash remaining at the end of the fiscal year was \$36,585, enabling us to make a significant donation to RCH in fiscal year 2023.

We had 43 paid members in fiscal year 2022. Unfortunately, we lost two members this year, Rosie Wetzel and Karen Bork. We have a lot to be proud of and grateful for.

The FY 2023 budget anticipates income from fundraising and the gift shop to exceed expenses by \$24,218. Of this \$14,708 is budgeted to distribute to RCH and \$3,000 for scholarships.

We will continue the Lights of Love fundraiser but have eliminated the Raffle. Policy changes at SSM have eliminated vendor fundraising like Nutman and Book Fair. Bake sales at Christmas and Valentine's Day have also been eliminated because of covid restrictions. However, our most successful fundraisers, in addition to Lights of Love, will continue: Flower Basket Sale, Mum Sale, Brat Frys, Candy Bar Sales and Roundup.

Gift Shop sales have lagged previous sales before covid. FY 2023 sales in the Gift Shop are budgeted to be about the same as FY 2022 sales.

Membership is also down since covid. We had 70 members in 2019 and 43 in 2022. The budget anticipates 45 members for FY 2023. Please try to recruit your family, friends and neighbors to join this amazing organization.

WHAT'S NEW AT SSM HEALTH RIPON COMMUNITY HOSPITAL

We have a lot going on at SSM Health Ripon Community Hospital these days - all exciting developments to help us continue our efforts to grow and offer as many services as possible at a local level. I'm proud to share with you but a few of these key advancements.

Day Stabilization Services

As community mental health needs continue to grow amid the COVID-19 pandemic, SSM Health Ripon Community Hospital, in collaboration with its Behavioral Health leaders, is introducing new Day Stabilization Services.

With this introduction this fall, Ripon Community Hospital will become the first SSM Health facility, both regionally and system-wide, to offer this innovative service. A public announcement is forthcoming as the area prepares for opening.

The project is being supported thanks to a \$158,000 Healthcare Infrastructure Capital Grant from the Department of Administration (DOA), on behalf of the State of Wisconsin. In addition, The Foundation for Ripon Medical Center has given \$75,000 to help with patient transportation needs once the program is operational.

The program's goal is to assist individuals in resolving their crisis and make appropriate community connections for ongoing services. Day Stabilization Services will be able to accommodate as many as eight behavioral health patients experiencing mental health crises to receive immediate services for up to 23 hours.

Services include:

- Assessment: medical/nursing evaluations and services, substance abuse assessments, mental health assessment, etc.
- Brief therapy: individual therapy, de-escalation, group therapy, communication and conflict resolution skills, relapse prevention, and psychoeducation
- Family/discharge planning, referrals to outpatient services, relapse prevention, coping skills, and other various emotional wellness activities

Watch for more details as we share with the general public through our local media representatives.

Orthopedic Coverage

SSM Health Ripon Community Hospital will be welcoming two SSM Health Fond du Lac Regional Clinic orthopedic surgeons starting in January 2023 to provide interim coverage as Jeffrey Meincke, MD, orthopedic surgeon, complete his final day of seeing patients that same month.

Emily Strahota, PA, physician assistant, who will continue to serve patients at our Ripon location, will be joined by Luke Fraundorf, MD, and Benjamin Wiseley, MD.

Luke Fraundorf, MD, orthopedic surgeon, earned his medical degree from the Medical College of Wisconsin, and completed his orthopedic residency at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Benjamin Wiseley, MD, orthopedic surgeon, earned his medical degree from the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health, and completed his orthopedic residency at the University of Wisconsin Hospital and Clinics.

The SSM Health Fond du Lac Regional Clinic is actively recruiting a new orthopedic surgeon for Ripon. We thank Dr. Meincke for his dedicated years of services to our patients.

Parkinson's Disease Program

SSM Health Ripon Community Hospital is pleased to offer a Parkinson's Disease program.

Parkinson's Disease is a progressive neurological disorder that results in slower and smaller movements. Signs and symptoms of Parkinson's disease may include tremor, slowed movement, rigid muscles, impaired posture and balance,

loss of autonomic movements, and writing and speech changes. Patients are referred to physical therapy to improve posture, strength, balance, walking, decrease fall risk, improve cardiovascular health, and improve non-motor symptoms of Parkinson's disease (I.e. memory, sleep, mental health, and attitude).

Patients with Parkinson's Disease can be referred by their primary care doctor or specialist to Ripon Community Hospital to participate in one-on-one outpatient therapy. Patients are evaluated by a LSVT Big Certified physical therapist and instructed in a home exercise program that is based on the principles of the LSVT Big Program. The treatment includes aerobic conditioning, maximal daily exercises, functional component tasks, BIG walking, and a carryover assignment. While patients may be referred at any stage of their condition, patients benefit the most in early or middle stages of Parkinson's Disease. Patients are expected to attend therapy at least two days a week for four to six weeks while being compliant with a daily home exercise program to reach their functional goals.




August Fast Facts: Lyme Disease

As summer continues in full swing, it is important to remember that with beautiful Wisconsin outdoors, comes concerns for certain summer illnesses such as Lyme disease. This disease is transmitted to humans through a bite of an infected tick. People most commonly get Lyme disease in three areas: New England and Mid-Atlantic, northern Midwestern states like Wisconsin and Minnesota, and northern West Coast like Oregon and Washington.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention states that the ticks usually need to be attached for 36 to 48 hours before they transmit Lyme bacteria. The CDC estimated that around 470,000 people are diagnosed with Lyme disease in the United States each year. Some early signs and symptoms of Lyme disease are skin rash, fatigue, chills, headache, and muscle and joint pain. Early Lyme disease is treated with antibiotics and people usually recover rapidly.

The WHA Information Center analyzed Lyme disease claims data from Wisconsin hospitals through the years 2016 to 2021. The count of visits by year and quarter increase for the summer months, but especially in July – September. When looking at gender, it was about even for males and females (51% for males, 49% for females). The average age of patient visiting the hospital for Lyme disease is 50 years old. Breaking the ages into groups shows that **age group 61-70 had the highest visit count**. The map of visit count by counties shows the highest counties being Waukesha and Dane, but there is an interesting cluster of high counts in the northwest area of Wisconsin.





Here are some tips from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention on tick bite prevention:

- Use EPA registered insect repellents.
- Wear clothing.
- Wear clothing treated with 0.5% permethrin. Re-treat clothing annually according to label instructions.
- Shower as soon as possible after spending time outdoors.
- Check for ticks daily. Ticks can hide under the armpits, behind the knees, in the hair, and in the groin.
- Tumble clothes in a dryer on high heat for 10 minutes to kill ticks on dry clothing after you come indoors.


