Greetings Volunteers,

I would like to take a moment to share my personal appreciation with you--*our amazing volunteers*-- for the amount of patience and understanding you have shown more recently with the additional training/vaccine requirements for health care volunteers. As we contin-



ue to navigate the daily changes in guidelines and recommendations, please know the additional requirements are all in an effort to keep you, our patients, visitors and staff safe. I am truly grateful for your compliance.

As the Delta variant continues to spread, and all three hospitals are operating close to full capacity every day, we continue to keep an eye on what is best for our volunteers. In June, we were given permission to bring back Phase III volunteers to departments that provide direct patient care. Given the rise in cases we are working closely with department leaders to identify if now is the best time to bring those volunteers back. Again, our top priority is the safety of our volunteers, staff, patients and visitors. Phase IV, or acceptance of new volunteer applications, will be put on hold until further notice at the request of our executive leaders.

It is great to see the volunteers who have returned to service. Not only are we excited to have you back but staff have noticed and appreciate your return as well. Please review the following updates and, if any questions, do not hesitate to reach out.

- Hospital greeter/transport volunteers and Health Center greeters have transitioned to the title of Patient Ambassador. The reason behind the name change was to combine the greeter and transport roles into one role that truly represent our patients.
- Mark your calendars for September 24th from 1:30-3:30 pm for the fall Partner drive through event. This is our opportunity to share our appreciation with you for your dedication.
- As a reminder, <u>Covid 19 vaccination verification must be received by November 1</u> in order to be compliant and continue your volunteer service.
- The annual Wish List funding process is underway. This year, \$25,000 has been approved for hospital departments in need of patient care equipment or items. The Partner Advisory Council will review funding applications at their September meeting and information regarding who is selected for funding will then be shared.
- Annual education sessions will be handled by mail once again this year. There will be no in-person education sessions. The volunteer handbook and additional information will be mailed mid-September to your homes. Please make sure to complete the quiz and return it according to the date provided.
- Mandatory <u>flu vaccination deadline this year is November 12</u>. Religious or medical exemption forms must be submitted to the hospital's Internal Occupational Health department by September 15 for review. A new form is needed for flu vaccination, a Covid 19 exemption form cannot be used for flu.
- If a form is needed, please email or call and I will forward the form. Look for more information in the annual education mailing.

- Annual requirement of 15 hours of service in 2021 will once again be waived due to volunteers not being able to return to service until April.
- Patient Ambassador volunteers for both the hospital and health center as well as the Gift Shop are in great need of volunteers. With the decline in membership, and some volunteers not able to return yet, we are having a number of slots in need of being filled in both areas. Please, if you are able to assist in either of these two main service areas, reach out to Keri Schwartz, <u>keri.schwartz@froedtert.com</u>.
- As you return to volunteering, please make sure you review the service description in your areas and only perform duties included in the description. A task performed in one area should not automatically be performed in another area. If you are finding there has been a change in duties as you return, please share this with Keri Schwartz so a review of the service description can be completed.
- Feeling ill prior to coming in for your shift? Make sure to evaluate how you are feeling prior to reporting for a volunteer shift. If you are unable to fill a shift, please let Keri Schwartz or Lori Keon know.

Last but certainly not least, included with this newsletter is our Volunteer infographic for the 2021 fiscal year (July 2020-June 2021). While only a snapshot of the impact volunteers have, it is an important summary of your dedication and will be shared far and wide with hospital staff and leaders.

Health Education Update:



SHINGLES

Shingles is caused by the same virus as chickenpox (Varicella zoster). Anyone who gets it had a case of chickenpox first, often decades earlier.

Shingles is a rash with shooting pain. It usually shows up on the upper torso of one's body, 2aASZ A or the eyes. The rash turns into red, fluid filled blisters. They usually dry out and crust over within 7 – 10 days.

When Varicella Zoster virus gets into the body, the first problem it causes is chickenpox. After that runs its course, the virus moves into the nerve tissue near the spinal cord and brain, where it stays.

We don't know why, but sometimes the virus "wakes up" and travels along nerve fibers to the skin. That's when it lands its "2nd punch": Shingles.

RISK FACTORS:

A weakened immune system might "wake up" the virus.

One is more likely to get Shingles if you are 50 or older; are under a lot of stress; have cancer, HIV or another disease that lowers your body's defense; have had a serious injury; take long term steroids. Many people who get shingles don't fit into any of these categories.

SYMPTOMS:

Early signs of Shingles include: fever, chills, and headache; nausea; itching; tingling in or under the skin; raised dots on the skin; stabbing or shooting pain.

Shingles can have complications after the rash is gone, including: brain inflammation or facial paralysis; eye problems and vision loss if it was in or around the eye; pain that lasts long after the outbreak, called "Postherpetic neuralgia".

One can spread this virus to people who have not had chickenpox and haven't been vaccinated. You're contagious until all sores have scabbed over.

The FDA has approved two Shingles vaccines, "Shingrix" and "Zostavax". Shingrix is newer and is preferred over Zostavax because it's considered 90% effective. CDC recommends that people over 50 get it, even if they have had Shingles before. They should also get it even if they have had the Zostavax vaccine.

Antiviral drugs can help heal one faster and cut the risk of complications. They are most effective if taken within three days of start of the rash.
