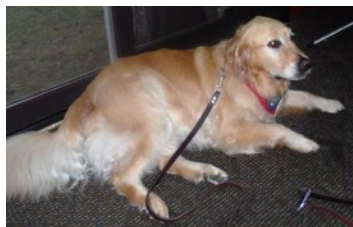

Wisconsin Lawmakers Release Rural Health Care Proposals, Includes WHA-backed initiatives

A group of rural Wisconsin lawmakers released a package of proposals October 11 that would provide financial support to expand the rural health care workforce, bolster WHA's quality improvement efforts and incentivize the creation of community wellness initiatives in rural communities. The proposal, packaged as the second round of a legislative agenda called the Rural Wisconsin Initiative, was released by Reps. Romaine Quinn (R-Rice Lake), Ed Brooks (R-Reedsburg) and Travis Tranel (R-Cuba City).

The Rural Wisconsin Initiative was created by these three lawmakers, with input from WHA's members and policy staff, to sustain rural communities into the future. The Initiative focuses on four key areas critical to rural economic development, including health care, technology, workforce and education. The announcement on October 11 regarding the health care portion of this agenda was the first of these four areas to rollout for the next legislative session. Report from 2016 Partners of WHA Convention

Keynote Speakers from General Meetings

Kim Hodus – Motivational Speaker – “How to Kick Up Your Heels and Live Life to the Fullest”

Kim gave four very inspiring thoughts on how to help live our lives to the fullest. They are as follows: show up and be present every day, know where you are headed, do something different to make the day fun, and be bold and stand out. Her talk was a very encouraging and positive start to the conference.

Chief Executive Officer Panel Discussion – Eric Borgerding, Steven Little, Jeremy Normington Slay, Therese Pandl and Bill Sexton

These five leaders from various health care facilities in Wisconsin talked about the change of health care in our state from sick care to health based. Integrated care, improved online access, a more holistic approach to care, choice of providers, and care co-ordination were some of the ways this is being implemented. One new form of health care that is just getting started is Tela-medicine. This consists of video conferencing with patient, nurse, and doctor online. Other topics that were discussed were heroin and other drug addictions, recruitment of new doctors, nurses and techs in rural locations, investing in scholarships, and improved nursing home care.

Dr. Todd Mahr – Pediatric Asthma Specialist – “All About Asthma : What’s New”

Dr. Mahr talked about asthma guidelines, family education, and improving pediatric diagnosis of asthma. He mentioned two important organizations in Wisconsin dedicated to the treatment of asthma; The Wisconsin Asthma Coalition and Children’s Health Alliance. Age and race are important factors in the progression of asthma. Over \$100 million is spent a year on the treatment of asthma in Wisconsin. Children, especially, need early treatment to enable their lungs to grow to full capacity.

Judi Zabel – Expert on Teenage Nicotine Addiction – “Tobacco Fixins’ – The New Frontier”

Judi was extremely informative about the new marketing of nicotine products that are geared towards the teenage market. Chewing tobacco, snus, dissolvables, cigarettos, hookah, and e-cigarettes are among the most popular forms. All are easily accessible to teens and often look like candy, pens, Kleenex packages, or breath mints. Since the passage of the Clean Air Act, tobacco companies have been developing new ways to entice teens to use their products. Some of these tobacco products contain as many as 4000 chemicals. It has been determined that nicotine products are linked to pancreatic Cancer. E- cigarettes can contain as much as 60% nicotine and their vapor is still contaminating our air. We should be looking for these harmful products in our homes, public facilities, and retail stores.
