The following statement from Eric Borgerding, President and CEO of Wisconsin Hospital Association, is a good indication of what WHA is working toward.

"Rising premiums threaten access to affordable health insurance and erode the impressive gains Wisconsin has made over the past 4 years in reducing the number of uninsured. With solutions from Washington nowhere to be found, WHA has repeatedly called on the Governor and Legislature to strike Wisconsin's own path and act to stabilize health insurance markets and sustain our gains in coverage. Governor Walker's Health Care Stability Plan is a crucial step in protecting access to Wisconsin's top ranked health care.

Even with today's great news, our urban, rural and safety net hospitals continue experiencing massive losses from Medicaid. Dubbed the "hidden health care tax," recouping these losses adds more than \$1 billion annually to the cost of

health care and health insurance. At the same time, the State is projecting an over \$100 million surplus in Medicaid, revenue essentially generated by Wisconsin's Medicaid hospital assessment. We call on the Governor and Legislature to take another important step and preserve access to care by using the surplus to improve Medicaid hospital payments and beging curbing the hidden health care tax.

the Viroqua Fire Department. -The Foundation is creating an annual ASK campaign to raise dollars to fund the purchase of 25

new hospital beds in 2019. The goal of the campaign is to raise \$100,000.00 in unrestricted funds. The Foundation has relied on event fundraising and memorial giving since its charter in 1985. The annual ASK event will create an opportunity for donors to continue to support the work of the Foundation. The Foundation will be reaching out to VMH Friends on an individual basis. Community Health Education

At our spring district meetings, we discussed changing the stigma of Substance Use Disorder (SUD), recognizing drug dependence as a disease (classified by the American Medical Association), looking at studies of the brain showing chemical changes when using substances, and recognizing that SUD can be treated, but it will be long-term treatment. Many of those with drug dependence also suffer from mental health issues. Addiction is a disease that knows no boundaries. It affects people from rural and urban areas, regardless of age or economic status.

Senator Tammy Baldwin recently discussed her mother's long battle with opioid dependence. Former Green Bay Packers Hall of Famer Chester Marcol speaks openly about his 30-year struggle with drug and alcohol dependence, and attempted suicide (USA Today Network – Wisconsin, March 2, 2018). He is now an alcohol and drug abuse counselor and inspirational speaker.

When people stop using opioids, they experience severe withdrawal. Medications help a person through withdrawal, giving them the ability to consider healthier choices and work through counseling and other treatment. Methadone and Buprenorphine (Suboxone) are opioids used to reduce withdrawal symptoms and relieve cravings.

Naltrexone (Vivitrol) helps block the effects of opioids so a person no longer feels the same high. But many treatment programs do not offer access to medication. Some patients choose not to use medications. The cost of medication and insurance prohibits treatment for many. Few doctors are trained in addiction medications, and many have not received federal waivers to prescribe buprenorphine, or may be reluctant to prescribe it without counseling and other wrap-around services available. Experts are looking at alternate medications, easier access to treatment medications, and training for doctors as potential ways to address the opioid crisis.

Relapse is frequently a part of recovery from dependence on drugs or alcohol. While "willpower" may have been a factor in the initial decision to use drugs, after a person becomes dependent on drugs, the chemical structure of the brain changes. The "willpower" to overcome the brain disease is not simple. If it were, we would not see the relapse rates we do. No reasonable person wants to be estranged from family, focused entirely on the next drug, or facing jail or prison. Treatment can dramatically improve the person's chance of sobriety. Studies show that 70 to 90 percent of people who complete an addiction rehabilitation program will relapse at least once before they maintain sobriety for a period of time. Successful treatment must include detoxification, inpatient and outpatient treatment, treatment medication, behavioral counseling, evaluation and treatment for mental health issues, and follow-up to prevent relapse. It's a long- term process, but is a person's life worth less?
