Public Policy Education

In January, an administrative order was issued by President Trump that required hospitals to list prices for their medical services. The intent was to provide patients with more transparency and competitive choice through the Charge Master system. While well-intentioned, the Charge

Master system is difficult to navigate. In addition, hospitals do not use a consistent format to classify services making it very difficult to have a "procedure to procedure" correlation.

Wisconsin residents are fortunate. The Wisconsin Hospital Association developed and provides a more user-friendly website called PricePoint. This system utilizes hospital discharge claims to create a way to compare hospital-to-hospital procedure costs. The data is updated four times per year. Medicare and Medicaid information is also included.

The website www.wipricepoint.org allows users to compare prices for similar services statewide or within a specific geographic area. This gives participants the opportunity to compare what different health systems charge for the same procedure. Once participants have this information, they will need to communicate with their insurer to find out what procedures and costs are covered.

Legislation to fix an issue that has created artificially low Graduate Medical Education (GME) caps for a small number of hospitals nationwide, including two Wisconsin hospitals, was introduced by Rep. Mike Gallaher (R-WI) and Ron Kind (D-WI). This bill would address the 1997 Medicare GME cap that froze the number of Medicare funded training slots for hospitals. The impacted hospitals hosted medical resident rotators for short periods of time resulting in their GME cap and "per resident amount" set at less than 1.0 FTE. The legislation would allow those hospitals to establish a new FTE cap and "per resident amount" in order to expand learning opportunities. The entire Wisconsin delegation and the Wisconsin Hospital Association support this bill. Watch for HEAT alerts regarding this legislation.

In the event of a Tornado Warning, an announcement will be made over the speaker system stating "Severe Weather Alert Tornado Warning" and staff will instruct you where to go for shelter.

Reminder to all volunteers

QUESTION: How do you protect yourself and the patient from the spread of infection?

ANSWER: Frequent hand washing; wear gloves; do not come in when feeling ill.

All volunteers should be cleaning their hands when entering and exiting a patient's room (alcohol-based hand sanitizers are outside of all patient rooms) as well as after using the restroom and before and after you eat. This is extremely important in the patient care areas and clinics. This is one way we can ensure the safety of our patients by not spreading infections.



Rainbow's End Camp


