# Great Advocacy Victories in 2015 - Register For WHA 2016 Advocacy Day

The Wisconsin Hospital Association worked diligently on behalf of our hospitals and health systems over the past year on multiple legislative priorities. Due to aggressive lobbying and grassroots advocacy, we were able to see multiple legislative victories in the past year.

Victory #1 – Medicaid Disproportionate Share Hospital (DSH) funding enacted in the biennial state budget. Due to many, many meetings with legislators and grassroots advocacy, DSH funding was reauthorized and made permanent in the recent state budget. DSH funding provided increased Medicaid reimbursement to hospitals based on their Medicaid volumes.

Victory #2 – Enactment of the Interstate Physician Licensure Compact. This legislation helps reduce red tape for licensing physicians in Wisconsin if those physicians come from another state that is also a member of the Compact. Due to strong HEAT grassroots efforts and diligent lobbying efforts, 77 legislators co-sponsored this legislation. The great news is that the State Assembly approved the legislation by an overwhelming 95-1 vote and the State Senate by a 31-1 vote. The legislation was signed into law by Governor Walker at Mayo Health System – Sparta and Burnett Medical Center (Grantsburg) (see photos) on December 14, 2015. Governor Walked is flanked in both photos by multiple hospital leaders and local legislators.

Both the above victories were propelled forward in part by hospital advocates in WHA's HEAT program who repeatedly contacted their legislators in support. If you would like to make an

Each year, the Wisconsin Hospital Association's Advocacy Day event grows both in number of attendees and impact. Last year, we hit 1,100 registrations and over 650 attendees participating in legislative meetings. That's more than a 138 percent increase in Advocacy Day attendance since 2005 and over a 333 percent increase in legislative visits during that same time period. These legislative meetings helped propel victories on priority hospital legislation, such as the DSH funding and Physician Interstate Licensure Compact legislation mentioned above.



At 2016 Advocacy Day you will hear the keynote speaker, Rick Pollack, president and CEO of the American Hospital Association (AHA). He's been a member of AHA's advocacy team for the past 33 years and will share his Washington DC insider's view of federal issues in a presidential election year. Our bipartisan legislative leaders' panel will round out the morning session followed by a luncheon keynote address from Gov. Scott Walker (invited). Then it's off to the State Capitol for legislative meetings. WHA provides an issues briefing and schedules all meetings for you.

# **Community Health Education Report**

Winter can take your breath away! Like it or not, winter has arrived right on schedule. For people with lung disease, each season can pose unique challenges. That bitter cold that can take our breath away can mean more trouble than a quick gasp of

air for those with respiratory problems.

Cold air can trigger bronchospasm, narrowing airways, making it harder for air to get in and out of the lungs. It's not just the cold that causes irritation. Extreme changes in temperature and humidity—from warm, moister air inside to cold, drier air outside—can cause irritation of the airways. During the winter months, all hospitals see an increase in patients with respiratory problems due to the cold weather, poor air quality, viruses, and bacteria. Some of these visits can be avoided.

If you have respiratory problems, stay indoors if possible on bitter cold or windy days. Take respiratory medications as prescribed. If going outside cannot be avoided, people with lung disease should cover their nose and mouth with a scarf before going outside. The scarf can trap moisture, so it not only warms but also humidifies the air you breathe. Keep indoor air as healthy as possible by avoiding air pollutants and humidifying the dry air. Your lungs require moisture—100% relative humidity—to keep their cleansing systems working and avoid infection. Our nose provides much of this moisture to incoming air, but in the drier air of wintertime it is more of a challenge. For people suffering from chronic lung problems, it can cause respiratory infections. Avoid people who are ill. And whether you have (or don't have) respiratory problems, get a flu shot. Influenza is bad, but it can be life-threatening for those with chronic lung disease.
