Volunteer Services Manager Notes...

Dear Volunteers,

Did you know that we currently have 33 volunteers committed to serving in the Hospital at this time? Pre-Covid, we had over 200 volunteers. Since we have been able to bring volunteers back in to the Hospital, the Volunteer program at Sacred Heart Hospital has almost started from scratch. We have had to revamp roles (Transport changed to Hospitality) and have been anxiously awaiting the "ok" to bring back programs (Eucharistic Ministry, Footsteps, and who could forget our furry

friends providing Pet Therapy). WE NEED MORE VOLUNTEERS! I know there are hesitancies and concerns with coming into the Hospital setting with COVID still out there, but as you get vaccinated and start to feel more comfortable being around people, reach out to a current active volunteer and ask them how they feel about their safety in the Hospital. They will be honest and share with you how safe they do feel. The Hospital has done so well with putting guidelines in place and making sure that the colleagues, patients, visitors, and volunteers are cared for.

Here are some opportunities that I have available and need filled as I write this note:

Family Waiting Center-Welcome the patient's family member to the waiting room. Take their information and share with them the layout of the room. Explain the surgery board so they can keep an eye on their loved one's process throughout surgery. Answer the phone and assist the surgical team and doctors.

Information Desk-The front entrance doors are now open from 8am-4pm so we are looking to fill this role. Greet people as they enter. Make sure they are wearing a mask and have screened/registered with the registration staff. Direct and escort the visitor to where they need to go. Answer the phone and transfer phone calls.

Hospitality-This used to be called Transport. Finding wheelchairs and making sure all areas are supplied with them. Moving patient beds. Assisting departments with errands. Escorting and wayfinding. Assisting the information desk volunteers. Delivery of patient belongings and gifts.

Gift Shop-General retail and merchandising. Helping customers find the perfect gift. Money handling. Computer/register use. Providing great customer service.

Eucharistic Minister-This begins June 1st. Provide communion for patients in the Hospital. Must have Parish acknowledgment letter stating that you have been trained for this role.

If any of these roles interest you, please reach out and we can chat about days and shifts that would work for you.

As Spring arrives and Summer quickly approaches, I hope you all are able to spend some time with family again.

COMMUNITY HEALTH EDUCATION

Who is in each phase for vaccine distribution?

Phase 1a: Health care personnel and Residents and Staff of Long-Term Care Facilities Phase 1b: Frontline essential workers (food packaging and distribution, teachers/school staff, childcare providers, utilities, etc.) and persons aged 65 years and older Phase 1c: Persons aged 16-64 years with high-risk conditions, people with increased risk of acquiring or transmitting COVID-19 (correctional facilities) and other essential workers (transportation, energy, electricity) Phase 2: All people aged 16 years and older not in Phase 1 who are recommended for vaccination

Adverse reactions:

These symptoms can occur within the 1st 3 days of vaccination and resolve within 1 – 2 days after onset. These symptoms are more frequent following the 2nd vaccine dose and among younger people as follows: Fatigue, muscle aches, headache, nausea, fever, chills, pain, and redness at injection site All COVID19 vaccines are free of charge. Must use same vaccine used in dose 1 for dose 2.

COVID vaccine and testing positive.

• Vaccines can be administered regardless of prior asymptomatic/symptomatic SARS-CoV-2 infection.

• Vaccines should not be administered to a person with an active COVID infection until they have recovered from acute illness. Applies also to those who become infected after the first vaccine dose.

What to expect after receiving the vaccine?

The 2 shots may not protect you until a week or two after your second dose. (CDC, 2020.) It takes 1 - 2 weeks following

the 2nd dose of the COVID19 vaccine to be considered fully vaccinated.

Does the vaccine give me COVID19? No, the vaccine does not give you COVID.

Should I get tested before I get the vaccine? No, testing is not required before vaccination.

Do I have to quarantine if I am exposed to a positive case after receiving both doses of the vaccine?

Yes, unless you meet the following criteria (CDC, 2021):

• Are fully vaccinated (i.e., ≥2 weeks following receipt of the second dose in a 2-dose series, or ≥2 weeks following receipt of one dose of a single-does vaccine) AND

• Are within 3 months following receipt of the last dose in the series AND

• Have remained asymptomatic since the current COVID-19 exposure.

If you meet the above criteria, you should still watch for symptoms for 14 days following an exposure. You should also continue to follow guidelines to protect yourself and others.

Does the vaccination completely prevent infection?

No. You can still get infected after you have been vaccinated, but chances of getting seriously ill are almost 0. Every person's immune system is different so when there is a 95 % efficacy, it means 95% of people who receive the vaccine but who would have gotten ill if exposed to the virus will not get sick. Remaining of vaccinated people if exposed to virus could be infected and get sick but extremely unlikely to need hospitalization.

The vaccine does not completely prevent infection; it reduces the amount of virus shed coming from the nose and mouth. A person who sheds less virus is less likely to transmit it.

Since the vaccine does not provide 100% protection from the infection, the Center for Disease Control recommends people continue to wear masks and social distance even after being vaccinated.

New Coronavirus Variant Mutations

B1351- South African and B117 United Kingdom variant. 40% of vaccinated people can have moderate disease. The result is a longer time to reduce transmission and to reach Herd Immunity.

NUTMAN SALE

BLESSING OF ST. FRANCIS STATUE

The statue of St. Francis was a donation of the Volunteer Partners in 2007 and placed in the garden outside of the Regional Cancer Center of HSHS Sacred Heart Hospital. Due to the remodeling of the Center, the statue was recently moved to the West side of the Hospital. A blessing of the statue was held on Tuesday, April 20, with Father Amal giving the blessing.

ADVOCACY DAY

Each year, the Wisconsin Hospital Association (WHA) sponsors Advocacy Day, which is an opportunity for attendees to learn about issues important to Wisconsin hospitals, and to advocate on behalf of their hospitals with their State legislators. In the past, other than last year when the event was canceled because of Covid-19, attendees traveled to Madison to participate in the event. This year the event was held virtually because of the continuing Covid-19 pandemic.

Nearly 1,000 hospital and health system leaders, providers, volunteers, clinical and

non-clinical staff and trustees attended the virtual event on April 14. Governor Tony Evers, former CNN White House Correspondent Frank Sesno and a bipartisan legislative panel moderated by WHA President and CEO Eric Borgerding all spoke to attendees throughout the morning event. Virtual visits with State legislators were held April 14-16, at which hospital representatives and legislators discussed key priorities for hospitals as lawmakers deliberate the 2021-2023 state budget.

Wisconsin hospitals have always been a critical safety net for the people of Wisconsin, but that has been especially true during this pandemic, in which they have:

- · Added or redeployed 20,000+ additional staff to assist the existing health care workforce.
- · Administered over 1.5 million doses of COVID-19 vaccine...and counting.
- · Established over 100 drive-through COVID-19 testing sites.
- Treated 28,000 patients admitted into the hospital for COVID; 50% of all admissions during the surge was COVID.
 Added 1,400 inpatient bed capacity to prepare for the surge.

Wisconsin's Medicaid reimbursement rates are some of the lowest in the country, covering only 66% of the cost of care, which is well below the national average of 90%. Over the last decade, lawmakers worked alongside WHA to address reimbursement shortfalls by increasing the Medicaid Disproportionate Share Hospital (DSH) program to support hospitals.

During the last biennium, the legislature passed, and the Governor signed, a budget that increased the Medicaid DSH program by \$40 million General Purpose Revenue-translating into a \$100 million increase in funding for hospitals. This increase in funding was only authorized through the current state budget, and needs to be permanently reauthorized in the budget being considered by the legislature. Without reauthorization, our state's hospitals will face a cut of \$100 million.

Therefore, WHA urged the Advocacy Day attendees to ask their state legislators, during their virtual visits, to support a permanent reauthorization of the \$40 million General Purpose Revenue Medicaid DSH increase provided during the last biennial budget. This is critical to avoid a \$100 million all funds reimbursement cut to Wisconsin hospitals during the next state budget.

The following volunteers of Sacred Heart Hospital participated in the virtual Legislative visit with Senator Smith, Representative Petryk, and Representative Emerson (represented by a staff member) Steve Werner, Bill McCullough, Mark Richter, Kathy Herfel and Jaci Fuller.

Items discussed included COVID-19 and the impact on hospitals and their staff, the shortage of staff and the need to have resources to strengthen the health care safety net and maintain access to critical life-saving care. Legislators were asked to support a permanent reauthorization of the \$40 million General Purpose Revenue Medicaid DHS increase provided during the last biennial budget.

SPOTLIGHT ON VOLUNTEERS*

Many volunteers at HSHS Sacred Heart Hospital are also active in other community organizations and volunteer activities. In this issue, featured are Steve Werner, Immediate Past President of the Volunteer Partners of HSHS Sacred Heart Hospital and Kathy Herfel, the current President.



Steve Werner was featured in an article in the January/February 2021 Catholic Life magazine for his involvement in the Eau Claire County Chapter of Wisconsin Right to Life. At HSHS Sacred Heart Hospital, Steve has volunteered in the Family Waiting Center, he has distributed Communion to patients and he has provided music therapy in the Behavioral Health Center and in the Physical Rehabilitation Center. He currently serves on the Volunteer Partners of Sacred Heart Hospital Council.

Steve has been active in the Right to Life organization since 2006, and has been its President since 2013. He became his mother's caregiver after she was diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease and Alzheimer's Disease. Prior to caring for his mother he had

worked with the developmentally disabled and was aware of the right to life movement and abortion. Steve is concerned about lives at risk of being aborted in the womb because of a genetic disorder like Down Syndrome and lives of the elderly amidst calls for euthanasia and assisted suicide becoming more prevalent and more troubling.



Kathy Herfel was also featured in an article in an issue of the Catholic Life magazine. Kathy uses her musical talents to help others in a time of need. She is involved at the parish, deanery and diocesan levels for the Council of Catholic Women. She is a member of the Threshold Singers, a group of usually three singers who sing hymns and other spiritual songs to the homebound or to those hospitalized, in nursing homes or in assisted living care. Kathy's region has 18 singers in the group and they have sung to patients at Sacred Heart Hospital. Kathy is the 2020/2021 President of the Volunteer Partners Council at Sacred Heart Hospital. She encourages everyone to try volunteering in some capacity.
